Welcome Police Chief Cisneros

In June, the Anaheim City Council approved the appointment of Jorge Cisneros to be our next police chief. Cisneros has 27 years of experience in law enforcement with eight of those years as a police chief.

Cisneros is currently the chief of police for the University of California, Irvine. Prior to UC Irvine, he was the chief of the Huntington Park Police Department. Chief Cisneros began and spent most of his career in law enforcement with the city of Long Beach, where he rose to the rank of commander and chief of staff. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, has a master's in criminal justice from Chapman University and a bachelor's in architecture from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.

Chief Cisneros is expected to begin his service at the end of July. We hope to schedule a District 3 meet and greet with our new chief in August. Stay tune for additional details!

Calling All District 3 Youth

If you are interested in representing the youth in our district, you can apply to be part of Anaheim's Youth Commission. The Youth Commission advises the Anaheim City Council on the needs, interests and concerns of young residents of our city.

To be considered for the commission, you must be between the ages of 14 and 26, have a 2.0 grade-point average and be able to attend monthly meetings. For those younger than 18, you must have a parent or guardian sign a permission slip. This is a one-year appointment. The deadline to apply is July 25. Our office will be interviewing all applicants. On July 31, Mayor Pro Tem Moreno is expected to appoint three people to the commission. To apply, click on this [link](#).

Increasing Affordable Housing

On June 19, the Anaheim City Council held a discussion on affordable housing in the city. The purpose of this discussion was to give city staff direction on what policies the city should continue to explore.

Recognizing that most of the development in our city is inaccessible and unaffordable to many, our office asked the Council to consider exploring an inclusionary zoning policy similar to those in the cities of Santa Ana and Tustin. In those cities, developers are required to include affordable housing, provide offsite affordable units within the city, or pay a fee if they are asking the city to rezone the property from industrial or commercial to residential, or if they are increasing the density within a residential area. The fees collected would be allocated to a housing trust, so the city can help create more affordable housing units.

Unfortunately, we did not have the votes to consider this policy exploration. Our office will continue to ask the Council to explore this option. Moving forward, city staff will develop a statement that emphasizes the Council's interest in affordable housing. In addition, staff will provide additional information on possible incentives for developers to produce more affordable housing units.

Update on Homelessness

There has been a lot of coverage on the city regarding homelessness. The city is currently involved in litigation along with other cities and the county of Orange. Federal Judge David Carter is asking that cities in north Orange County identify sites within their cities that could serve as emergency shelters. Anaheim has identified three potential sites that are undergoing further feasibility study. Should they prove viable, the city will share locations as part of an extensive community outreach effort.
